Q&A and Comments relative to the content of the webinar

Question: I'm hard pressed to see what strengths the NA approach has (other than its emphasis on participation) that is not within the Dutch approach - what do you think?

Answer: Participation is a key issue in redesigning organizations. In the beginning, the Dutch approach was rather 'technical, engineering'. The Dutch approach developed by engaging people in the (re-)design process.

Question: Of course participation is important but what other strengths do you see in the NA approach?

Answer: Change management

North American STS is more focused on variance control and, more recently, on deliberation analysis.

What are the distinctive features of the systems approaches?

- OST especially focused on the external environment; simplicity and depth of the 2 design principles (DP 1 and DP2) along with the six motivational factors
- VSM especially useful in non linear environments; management processes and the application to managers' work/contributions in a self managing environment; application of recursiveness for each business unit/team

The application of systems organisation design is especially relevant in the context of IT driven projects
